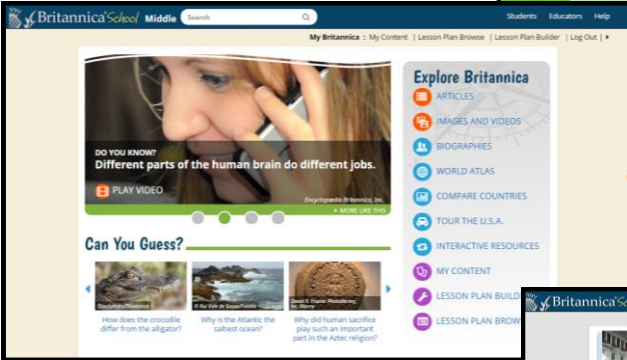

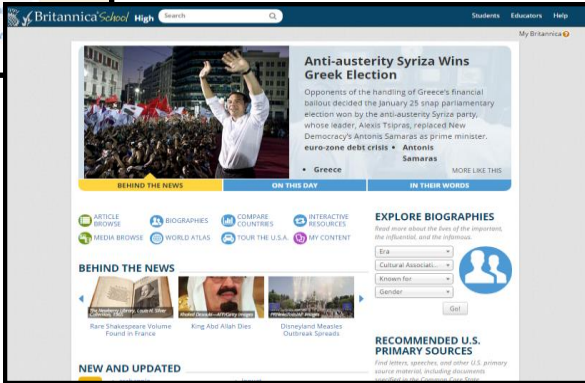

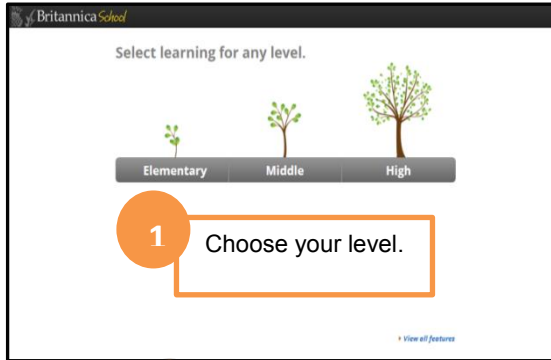

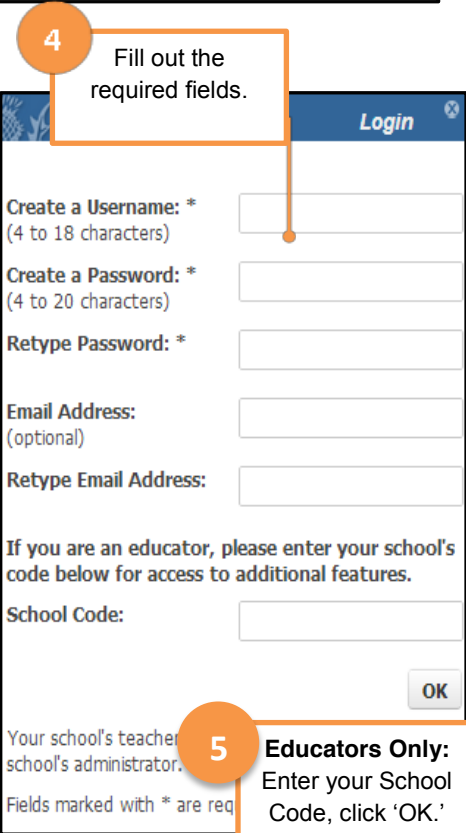


1 Choose your level.



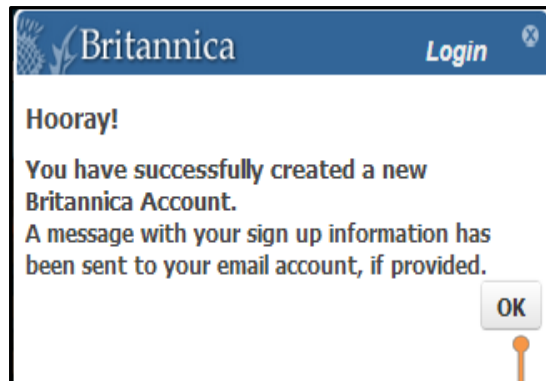
2 Click 'My Britannica.'
